Please note that if you are in the proximity of a defibrillator when an incident occurs e.g. Cardiac Arrest, Heart Attack, Stroke, Choking or if somebody collapses call 999 and then call the First Responders as outlined above. The relevant phone number is displayed on posters in both churches. When you dial 999 the operator will ask you if there is a defibrillator near by and will ask you for the location code. The location code is on the front of the defibrillator box. The operator will then provide you with the code to open the box. The code is also known to the first responders and is available in the sacristy of both churches. On the advice of the defibrillator providers the code is not available to the general public due to fear of tampering.

Bishop Leahy's New Year invite to people of Limerick to join in 'Jubilee of Hope' across 2025

Bishop Brendan Leahy has urged the people of Limerick to embrace Pope Francis' invitation to become "pilgrims of hope" throughout 2025, a Jubilee Year declared by the pontiff. Jubilee Years, which happen every 25 years, are typically associated with mercy and forgiveness.

The theme for Jubilee 2025 is 'Pilgrims of Hope', a theme seeking to encourage everyone to be messengers of hope and love on a planet fractured by war, famine and other crises.

People are invited across the world to embark on their own pilgrimages to key religious sites globally, nationally and locally to obtain a plenary indulgence during the year. At a national level, pilgrimages can be made to Knock, Lough Derg (Donegal) and Croagh Patrick, while here in Limerick, Bishop Leahy has designated St. John's Cathedral, the Kileedy Mass Rock and the Church of Ss Peter and Paul, Kilmallock as pilgrimage sites.

Points to Ponder

16 February 2025

Much of what drives us today is based on image. How we will appear to others can seem more important than reality. We see this with fake Instagram accounts, fake followers, fake articles, and overblown personal stories on social media, with the many filters on our phone cameras and the lengths we go to in order to get more followers. This way of living has seeped into our consciousness. The way of Christ is a different way in which we are asked to be humble and selfless, not in a rosetinted capacity but in a real way, a way that can hurt us, away that in some capacity mirrors Jesus's walk to Calvary. Just like with our phone filters, it is very easy to sentimentalise Christianity. There is no evidence to suggest that Jesus was sentimental. His message went to the core of our being, and today in the beatitudes he is asking us for some of the humility that he has shown when he died for our sins.

We have been asked to reappraise where we are in our faith path. Where we go from here is anyone's guess. But with the Gospels as our signposts we have a wonderful opportunity to grow as disciples of Jesus and live as though within the beatitudes. This may be a difficult thing to attain but it is also possible. Jesus, who is perfectly human as well as perfectly divine, proved this to us with his example. intercom@catholicbishops.ie
